

Historical Record. of Westfield Methodist

Read before the Church Sabbath.

to 1829. A.D.

The Erie Am Conf which includes this place was formed by the Genl Conf. which met in Cincinnati May 1836. but it has a history 40 years older than that. Its inheritance was then named but it had a birth long before. The Methodist Minster followed them as elsewhere closely upon the wave of emigration preaching the gospel wherever in Cabin or Forest he could find a human soul. Organizing 2 or more into classes, appointing a leader & then pushed out into the wilderness regions beyond. after the scattered flock. No men ever endured more sacrifice or were more heroic than the early Methodist Ministers. No man rightly can call these early years of its history down to 1828 when the first M. E. Church was built in Westfield as the heroic period of Chautauqua Methodist History.

As early as 1750 the French had taken possession of this country as a part of the great valley of the Mississippi which they claimed with Canada they had erected 3 fortresses & garrisoned them well with troops for its protection. One of these Proque Isle stood on the shore of the Lake one mile below Erie. Another near the village of Waterford 12 miles south of Erie which they called Fort la Boef. The 3rd stood near the mouth of French Creek just below Franklin which was called Fort Venango. The soldiers stationed in these were the first white men in the wilderness of the West.

The first Native white man who penetrated their dark depths was George Washington, afterwards the Father & deliverer of his Country. In the year 1754 he was sent by Gov Dinwiddie of Virginia with a message to the Commandant of Fort la Boef. to induce him to relinquish the post as it was claimed by Virginia. The mission was not successful & Washington returned by French Creek to Fort Du Quene where Pittsburg now stands. Then through an unbroken solitude took hence in Williamburg Va. Having been providentially preserved while every one who started with him lost their lives through accident or exposure which befell them on their way.

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after the conquest of the French Possessions in North America by Great Britain this tract was ceded by the French to Great Britain by the Treaty of Paris in 1763, & made over by them to the U.S. by the Treaty of Paris Sept 3 1783.

X After the boundaries of the state of Penna & N. York were fixed along their western line the state of Connecticut continued to claim a vast body of land lying west of these states but following the magnanimous example of Virginia who in 1784 ceded to the full government all lands claimed by her west of the Ohio River so she in 1786 ceded her lands to the full government reserving only 120 miles west of Pennsylvania on the south shore of Lake Erie called the Con't Water Reserve this however was given to Ohio in 1801 when Ohio became a State Land office was established in 1795 at Erie & Capt John Kelso & Rufus Reed were the first settlers after Mad Anthony Wayne as the Indians called him had conquered them in many battles & they had become quiet the tide of Emigration began to flow westward toward the Valley Sun - the French posts became trading places from which the hardy Yornancy radiated into every portion of the wilderness, their hardships were terrible & we reap in joy what they sowed in tears Province was caud along the lakes at lower more expense or from Pittsburgh to Meadville then called French Creek northward on the backs of men - Mr Reed of Erie laid the foundation of the vast fortune he left behind him by transporting necessary provisions in pack horses from Buffalo to Erie more than 100 miles by rough roads on the lake shore

Robt R Roberts, after Bishop Roberts, its first class leader
Rev Jacob Gundell & Rev Jas^m McClland Irish Local Preacher
began travelling the country & preaching far & wide the distances they compassed the summer they preached & the spiritual seed they scattered is known alone to him whose care alights extended to forest cities In 1800 Rev P B Davis of the Balt Conf
was sent to Chenango Circuit one of the 2 Irish preachers spent their time on horseback their Circuit was limited but his wide spread they travelled far but the pastor

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He was the type of the class of whom it is said
"Thought in a base & rugged way
Through devous lonely wilds I stray
Thy bounty shall my fancies beguile
The baneful wilderness shall smile"

→ Although there were 8 annual Conferences in 1800 there were no fixed boundary lines and the preachers attended the Conf most convenient to their work.

1802
In the fall of 1802 Mr James McMahan from Huntington
Pa settled 1½ miles west of Westfield which was the first white
settlement. The following spring Mr Jos McMahen & Mr Edward
McHenry were added to the settlement becoming members of the latter
community. From 1796 - 1812 Western N.Y. was nominally in
the bounds of the Philadelphia Conf. in 1807 it was Rev Phil
Peter Van Nist. to form a circuit called the Holland
Purchase Circuit embracing all that part of N.Y. lying
west of the Genesee river. He was in the habit of stopping
at Mr Fillmore about the centre of his tract & he was enabled
and used with the Church. in 1809 he recd license to preach
& he was among the first to preach west of Genesee river
for 9 years he traveled as a local preacher over the whole
Holland Purchase preaching wherever he could find an
ear to hear the gospel. He was after a Presbytery Elder

In 1809 Rev Geo Lane was sent to minister to the
Holland Circuit - He started from Buffalo in a cutter
for his field of labor. Rev overtook Mr Gould his wife who
had never been near Sheridan having been away on a visit
& were returning home. Night fell upon them while endeavoring
to break through a snow drift near Callaianus Creek
they turned back resumed their journey next day. A clark
was formed at Mr Gould's Consistory Dau Gould & wife
Stephen Bush & Elijah Risley one of the first classes formed
by a Conf mounted in Chautauqua County during this
year Rev Dr Richmond a local preacher & Physician
preached & practiced between Mayville & Westfield preaching
once at least that year at Westfield & roads. He after
turned to Westfield & lived in the front now occupied
by the church his house ^{now to the rear} becoming the Parsonage

1803

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In 1810 an enter class of 10 members settled in Valla Nova Sunday at delayato with Genesee Conf at Lyons N.Y. asking a Holday its soon in a bair asking for preaching. The Circuit year. 3 men sent. Billy Brown as he was called was one. He was a peculiar man. Had a great fancy for odd passages in scripture & was remarkable for his faith & prayer. There is no authentic account of this work. Elijah McColf had no stated bairony if he did had he did not keep it. Mauday off his reservation as far as Warren Par. A class was formed at Fredonia this year consisting of Justin Herman & wife Jeannette Bassett & wife & others Chautauqua Circuit reported 30 members this year

Chautauqua Circuit included the present towns of Clymer Ripley Westfield & Mayville Forestville Sheridan, Fredonia & Sandville Sherman'sc was so named from Chautauqua lake said to be the highest water in the world 1305 ft above tide water & 725 above lake said. 16 miles in length 3000 in width magnificently siling like a queen at its Head James town reprey as it fell. in a branch of the Canevango Creek which furnishes an immense water power the name is of Indian origin of the many legends relative to the wind. "An Indian maid in early days he said

From from her tribe some strangers home to flee

From her side Captain steel embrace she fled

Her fleet foot bore her over a rugged hill

Which over looked thy banks & swiftly sped

Chautauqua at which embraced in that day the present towns of Clymer, Ripley, Westfield, Mayville, Forestville, Sheridan, Fredonia, Sandville Sherman'sc 1800 was so named from Chautauqua lake 1320 ft above tide water. The Genesee Conf of 1812 met at Niagara U.C. July 28 Rev Benjamin L. Paddock, Samuel Lane were ap'td to Chaut Circuit Classes were now formed at Hanover as once & as north End of Chaut lake when Dr Richmond had his home there was also a Class at Southard which was near Devittville Preaching was held regularly at Mayville C House by Rev Smith a local preacher as well as by the Circuit Preacher this Bro Smith lived near the head of Chaut lake

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He was lame once at a Dr meeting he attempted to preach for Rev 125' And there appeared a great wonder in the Heavens &c. He had not gone far when he appeared bruised as the Preachers say. He closed by saying "Bless each us many lessons learn one few. You scarcely ever find them trying to get honey from a red clover blossom though sweeter than the white. The same is then bites are too sharp. So be much content having what the white. My text is a red clover blossom but my bill is too dull I cannot reach it & I will try hereafter to content myself with what I can reach" There must have been a class this year south of Quincy at Park School Miss Fannie Fuller was leader. Some of the Park family belonged there. There was preaching & possibly a class at Betsy Stevens where Polly belonged who never prayed without its ending in a shout. Then she had a mount of Transfiguration & remarkable answers to her prayers especially in one remarkable instance in the case of a son whom she desired should not outlive her. In the year 1813 the Ohio Conf took charge of Chancery It met in Steubenville & Bp M^r Kendree presiding (McKendree) John McMaham was appointed art Preacher to have an assistance It comprised about the Presid Jamesport Frederic part of Erie Dist. Two local Preachers were called in aid & success followed their work & at Conf the Circuit reported 150 members. The Ohio Conf of 1814 met in Cincinnati Sept 8th Bp Asbury presiding Jacob Young was appointed elder & Brewster Westlake to Chancery Ct. Westlake was tried on trial this year. He labored afterwards in the O Conf till 1836 when he was transferred to Indiana where he died in 1845 Jacob Young the elder was a peculiar though noble man. He uttered his prayers & sermons in solemn song with strange cadence. He was one of the hardest & most unflinching of the pioneers. Chancery Circuit reported 157 members this year. The Ohio Conf of 1815 met in Lebanon O. Sept 14 Bp^r Asbury & McKendree presiding Jacob Young was still retained as Elder & Samuel Lane to Chancery Circuit. It is probably there was Circuit Preacher at Gooducks Lanning a short distance S.W. of Mansfield this year also at Roden S. Hours with Joel Clarke the Leader of the class at Bricks settlement also it was now a 4 week Circuit this year Dan B Finley held a quarterly meeting at Southard north end of Chancery lake. The Circuit reported this year 322 members. The Ohio Conf of this year was held at Louisville Ky Sept 3 1816 James B Finley P.E. D D Davids was Ch Preacher

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D D Dandridge was sick this year on trial. He had been a practicing Physician. He had a sharp shrill voice & was very effective in meetings. He spent his old age in comfort & died in Dayton Ohio about 1873. ^{80 years of age} As long as he was able to move from place to place he buried himself in selling 2 vols of his Remins which he had published. He was very fond of Coffee & he often asked for a 2 or 3 Cup by jocularly exclaiming I will take a little more of the slow poison & run it up. Song Stated
Chas Ct reported this year 500 members. The Ohio Conf of 1817 was held at Zanesville & J B Finley Pres P.E. & Curtis Goddard Pm Chas of Chs Circuit. Goddard was sick into the O Conf. in Sept 1814 this year Finley held a Camp Meeting at North East. When Abel Pick was converted by hearing the song "Vain delusive world adieu" a Camp meeting had never been held there before & multitudes came from Amity. It opened favorably & many were converted Sabbath morning the last was & I saw the dead & the whole congregation was milled into tears aloud. Cries went up to Heaven for mercy at night the altar was crowded. Among them were several sailors who had come down from Erie to spend Sunday in a social. The camp meeting saved many a soul of life in this region, among others Abel Pick was a noble gifted man whose children now are up & call him blessed. Circuit reported 532 members.
The Ohio Conf of 1818 met Aug 7 at Steubenville, O. J B Finley P.E., John Farmer P.C. the latter was a very large man & rode away from horse who like Bucephalus of old allowed no one but his master to mount him. He was taught to follow no one who looked at him before his big steed large & powerful he was obedient to his master's touch & would run wild and no salutes being well off. He made a start of clothes at Gerris Fools farther when they heard Circuit preaching South & described near Glen miles where a class had been in existence for sometime J B Finley deserves a passing notice. He travelled incessantly in 1807. He attended a Camp Meeting at Cane Ridge Ky a wicked & drunken young man 20000 people were present all most intensely excited Rev Wm Burke was preaching some were singing some praying some cursing & while looking on says he a strange full look possessed of me such as I never felt before I became so weak I had to sit down I went into woods fell no better & returned I stepped on a log that I might better see - The sight was awful at one instant I saw 500 people swept down as if 1000 gun battery had fired upon them the shrieks & shouts sent the very Heavens my hair stood up my blood ran cold I fled into woods & cursed the day I came I turned away to a lamen light began to grieve my nerves when I found a company of desperate men drunk & fambles fighting I took a drink sleep

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July I was as near Hell as I wished to be in this world or the world to come
more in trouble than ever I spent the night in a barn in a most deplorable
state of mind finding me of my companion in the money I said Come let
us be off I can stand it no longer I ^{at home} roared till most money went into the
woods & prayed no sooner did my knees touch the ground than I fell my cries
soon attracted the neighbors among them a German who prayed for me after a long
struggle heaven looks upon my soul I cried, I laughed, I shouted no one understood
me but my Dutch brother who had prayed for me. Tinsley wandered away from God
after this but returned to God & became one of the most laborious & faithful of mis-
sionaries traveling over 300 miles a year in his round as P.E. The O. Conf of 1819 met
in Cincinnati Wm Sprague P.E., Robt C. Hattin & Henry P. Hiltz, Preachers
of ^{Chase's} Chas' Cl. which latter had now been divided Lake Circuit (and)
from Sabracreek to North East lying along the lake Preaching regularly
this year at Henry Abell's also at the log laven kept by David Easter
when the Spencer block now stands Hattin preached there once every after
he had been rolling on the floor several hours having put soap & sugar
on a boil to bring it to a head. Preaching regularly at Gorham's Tannery
Roger S. N. Looli, & Hattin voice could be heard a mile &
these were his days of power. There was a camp meeting this year on the
ridge above RR this side of depot where Barden the day man lives
multitudes were converted who came to laugh. Hiltz was a peculiar
man, this time was in Forestville when for several years he way
was on saw on his own account. He took a class for Post, S.H. formed and
at Zanesville now Ripley also at Portland & strengthened this already
formed. He was of medium height, stout built, & round features dark
hair parted in the middle his locks hung down in curls. He was
full of anecdotes which he told with effect. He had been a sailor in
his younger days & was fond of singing sailor songs this community
the last author jacket we no longer will wear

But robes of bright glory all shiny of air
With a crown on our head one day seeing the sun

From song to song triumphantly run - was a favorite with us
another beginning - He tells you why I love the melody
Because they sing & shout the best.

He was known and respected as crazy Hiltz

He died triumphantly at Forestville in 1840 aged 65

A singular circumstance occurred this year in the experience of Aford
Brownson. He had made an appointment to preach in the house of Amos Smith
Hubbard Jr. (who had become quite feeble) for his especial benefit on his way to the
house he felt unfeasted with the words I am now ready to be offed & the time
of my departure is at hand. He concluded it would not be proper under the cir-
cumstances it would look too much like a funeral service before the man was
dead. He could think of no other task he was shut up to this crowded apartment
at close Fashed Smith spoke with much feeling, writhed &c as she also sat down
thru her head back gashed & mangled, a backslidden member was received
& was killed 2 days after at a raising Genius Conf met at Paris N.Y.

living & hope some successor will write the history of the
